

TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Troparion (7):

By Your cross You destroyed death; You opened Paradise to the thief; You changed the lamentation of the myrrh-bearers to joy, and charged the apostles to proclaim that You are risen, O Christ our God, offering great mercy to the world.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Kontakion (7):No longer shall the dominion of death be able to hold humanity, for Christ went down shattering and destroying its powers. Hades is bound. The prophets exult with one voice: The Savior has come for those with faith, saying: Come forth, O faithful, to the resurrection!

Now and for ever and ever: Amen

Theotokion (7):O All-praised Treasury of our resurrection, we hope in you, bring us up from the pit and depth of sins, for you have saved those subject to sin by giving birth to our Salvation, O Virgin Mother.

Prokimenon (7):

The Lord will give strength to His people; the Lord will bless His people with peace. Verse:Bring to the Lord, O you sons of God; bring to the Lord young rams.

Epistle:Reading of the Epistle of St. Paul to the Ephesians. (Eph 2,14-22)
Brethren: Christ is our peace, he who made both one and broke down the dividing wall of enmity, through his flesh, abolishing the law with its commandments and legal claims, that he might create in himself one new person in place of the two, thus establishing peace, and might reconcile both with God, in one body,through the cross, putting that enmity to death by it. He came and preached peace to you who were far off and peace to those who are near, for through him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and sojourners, but you are fellow citizens with the holy ones and members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the capstone. Through him the whole structure is held together and grows into a temple sacred in the Lord; in him you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in the Spirit.

Alleluia Verses:

Verse (7):It is good to give praise to the Lord; and to sing in Your name, O Most High.Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia.

Verse (7):To announce Your mercy in the morning and Your truth every night. Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia.

Gospel:(Lk 12,16-21)

The Lord told this parable: "There was a rich man whose land produced a bountiful harvest. He asked himself, 'What shall I do, for I do not have space to store my harvest?' And he said, 'This is what I shall do: I shall tear down my barns and build larger ones. There I shall store all my grain and other goods and I shall say to myself, "Now as for you, you have so many good things stored up for many years, rest, eat, drink, be merry!" But God said to him, 'You fool, this night your life will be demanded of you; and the things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?' Thus will it be for the one who stores up treasure for himself but is not rich in what matters to God."


Thanksgiving Day .- A civil holiday observed annually in the United States of America on the last Thursday in November. The president issues a proclamation, calling on the citizens, all Federal officials, and others subject to Federal authority to observe the day as one of national thanksgiving and prayer. The governors of states concur in the president's proclamation and also recommend the citizens to observe the holiday, and all public business is suspended. The custom originated in 1621, when Governor Bradford of the Plymouth colony appointed a day for public praise and prayer after the first harvest, and the practice spread throughout the other New England colonies. The first national observance was when President Washington, at the request of Congress, recommended Thursday, November 26, 1789, to the people of the United States "as a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God". This proclamation exhorted the people to "beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions, to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best". It was the first observation of the day on the date that present custom holds it. In 1817 Thanksgiving Day was first officially noticed in New York State, and by 1859 its observance had spread to twenty-eight states and two territories. In 1863 President Lincoln made his first proclamation, naming the last Thursday of November as a day of national observance, which day President Johnson also selected in 1867 and President Grant in 1870. Since then there has been no change, the last Thursday in November being named in each year's proclamation. Catholic recognition of the day by special religious features has only been of comparatively recent date and not as yet (1911) of official general custom. Historians of the day attempt to trace the origin of Governor Bradford's idea (1621) back to the old Hebrew Feast of the Tabernacles and through the ages to the ancient Greek Harvest Feast, Thesmophoria, the Roman Cerealia, and the English Harvest Home. In the Dominion of Canada the governor-general by proclamation sets aside the last Monday in October as a legal holiday for the purpose of acknowledging God's providence and expressing the nation's dependence on His bounty. Feast of the Entrance into the Temple of Our Most Holy Lady, the Theotokos November 21

- + The central image of the loon and the feast is one of giving back to God.
- First, the parents of the Theotokos, Sts. Joachim and Anna, present their only child a three-year-old daughter, to dedicate her to God at the Temple.
- The young child herself, the
 Most Holy Theotokos, also gives herself
 completely as an extraordinary gift to God,
 standing before Zacharias with her arms
 reaching up to him.
- In the upper left corner, we see a glimpse into the life that the Theotokos will lead in the temple until the time of her betrothal to St. Joseph.
- + She is shown seated on the steps of the Holy of Holies.
- + An angel attends to the one chosen by God to bring the Savior into the world. Holy Tradition tells us that the Panagla was fed by the angels during the years that she lived in the Temple.



- + St. Joachim gathered the young girls of the neighborhood to form an escort to lead the Most Holy Theotokos to the Temple, Eighting the way with torches.
- St. Gregory Palamas says that "they led this truly saccified child of God... into the Temple of God. And she, peng filted with Divine gifts even at such a lander ase.... she.



- Her parents set her on the first of 15 steps up to the Temple, but the three-year-old Panagia runs quickly to the top herself.
- The high priest, Zacharias, receives her into the Holy of Holies.
- In this way, the New Covenant begins to be written. The Panagla becomes the Ark of the New Covenant with her womb being the new dwelling place for the Most High God



Feastday Tropar: "Today is the prelude to God's plan for the world, and the announcement of the salvation of mankind: in the Temple of God the Virgin is seen openly, foretelling to all the coming of the Christ!
